It is with great joy that I share with you our Annual Report, highlighting some of the projects we helped fund in 2024. Thanks to your generous support, Salesian missionaries in more than 130 countries continue to deliver life-changing education, workforce development, social programs, and critical humanitarian aid to the most disadvantaged communities.

This mission began in 1859 with a young priest named John (Don) Bosco, who first cared for 18 poor street children. Together, they embraced a calling to bring hope to thousands of youth, instill confidence, and teach the skills needed for a better life. Today, St. John Bosco's legacy reaches millions—thanks to partners like you.

In 2024, donor funding empowered youth through sports in Rwanda, Ecuador, and Ukraine; improved infrastructure for residences in Tanzania and Zambia; and brought safe water to youth in Burundi, Uganda and Kenya through our **Clean Water Initiative**.

Last year, Salesian Missions helped ensure the safe delivery and distribution of more than **\$4.1 million in food assistance** and more than **\$4.3 million in other supplies and equipment** donated by partner organizations.

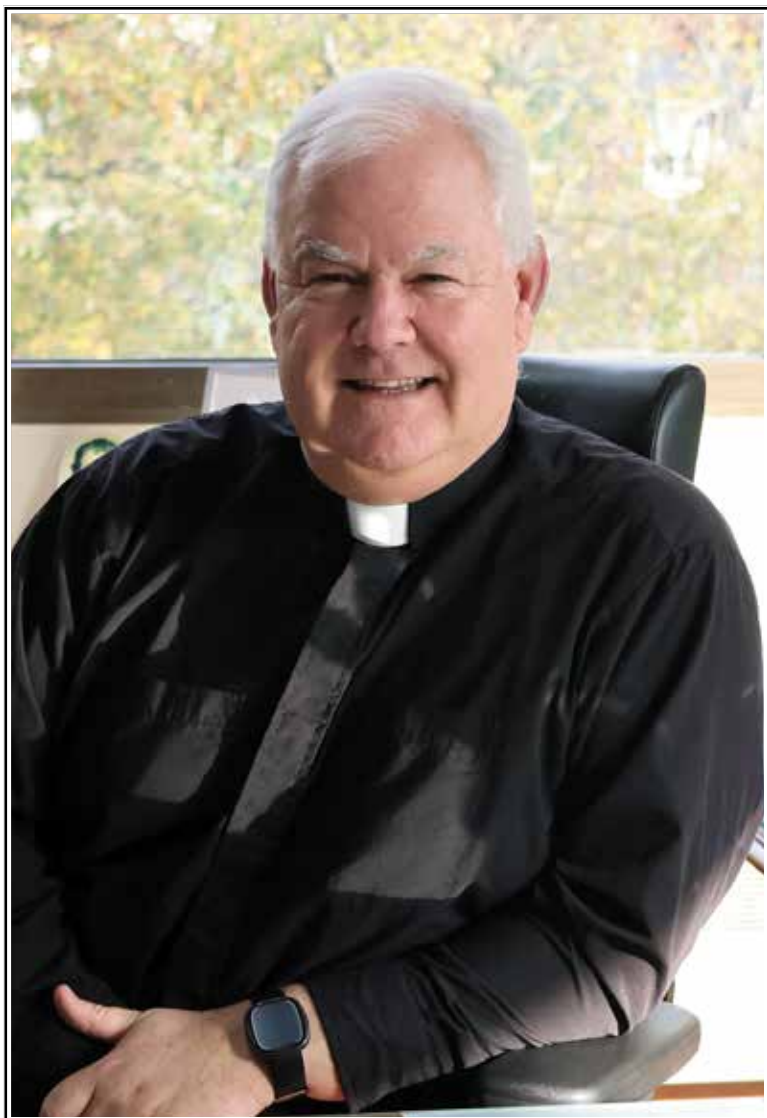

SALESIAN MISSIONS

Salesian Missions is headquartered in New Rochelle, New York, and is part of the Don Bosco Network — a worldwide federation of Salesian NGOs. The mission of the U.S.-based nonprofit organization is to provide support and raise funds to assist needy youth and families through programs carried out by Salesian missionaries. Millions of youth facing adversity have received services specifically funded by Salesian Missions and its donors. Funds are also raised to assist with humanitarian emergencies caused by natural disasters, wars and violence. This Annual Report provides information on some of the projects which received support from Salesian Missions in 2024.

There are nearly 30,000 missionaries (priests, brothers and sisters) worldwide — many are located in the poorest places on the planet.

Salesians work and live within the communities they serve. As a result, they:

- Know the local needs better than outside groups.
- Understand the local political and social climate.
- Are able to build strategic partnerships with governments and NGOs (nongovernmental organizations).
- Can quickly respond to emergencies and provide urgent humanitarian assistance efficiently.

ONGOING PROGRAMS

EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Education provides a chance for a better life. Salesian missionaries establish vital primary, secondary and vocational schools in some of the most impoverished and remote places on earth.

YOUTH CENTERS

Functioning side by side with Salesian schools, youth centers offer a safe place for engaging young people in constructive activities during leisure time — such as sports, art and music.

HOMELESS YOUTH

Salesian programs help to counsel, stabilize and educate homeless youth so that they have more options and opportunities. More than 330 shelters and homes meet an array of basic needs by providing safe shelter, food and clothing.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

The Salesians of Don Bosco are considered the largest private provider of vocational and technical training in the world. Around the globe, there are nearly 1,000 Salesian vocational, technical, professional and agricultural schools — giving youth the skills for stable employment.

HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE

Salesian Missions is perfectly positioned to aid in emergency relief during times of natural disasters, traumatic circumstances and civil strife. In 2024, humanitarian assistance was provided to those displaced due to conflict in the Democratic Republic of the Congo and Ukraine as well as in other countries.

FOOD SECURITY

Sadly, there are more than 900 million people who face severe food insecurity and 2.4 billion people globally who do not have regular access to food. Of that, more than 295 million people across 53 countries and territories experienced acute levels of hunger — an increase of 13.7 million from 2023. About half of them are young people who face starvation and death. Salesian Missions food aid programs feed students — reducing child malnutrition while increasing school attendance.

DISTRIBUTION OF AID

From donated school supplies and furniture to meals, Salesian Missions is entrusted to deliver life-changing aid safely — even in very hard-to-reach places. As a recipient of the Ocean Freight Reimbursement Grant program, Salesian Missions transports this aid at low or no cost.

CLEAN WATER INITIATIVE

When basic needs such as a safe water source aren't met, it negatively impacts entire communities. Salesian Missions has made water projects a top priority in the places where schools and youth centers are located. Work includes providing new or improved water systems and sanitation facilities.



REFUGEES & INTERNALLY DISPLACED PEOPLE

At the end of 2024, an estimated 123.2 million people worldwide were forcibly displaced due to persecution, conflict, violence, and human rights violations. This number includes 31 million refugees and an estimated 49 million children below 18 years of age. In response, Salesian Missions provides humanitarian assistance and educational programs for refugee and internally displaced populations.

HEALTH & MEDICAL SERVICES

Worldwide, Salesian missionaries care for the sick and provide preventative care through more than 150 clinics, hospitals and dispensaries (many located in rural areas). Both physical and psychological health services can be found in many communities alongside other Salesian programs.

GENDER EQUALITY

The growth and development of young girls and women is essential for families and communities. By providing women with education and support, families are made stronger. Social outreach programs, childcare support and skills training make it possible for women to have better jobs — and be better able to keep their families intact.

MORAL & SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT

Based on the beliefs of our founder, St. John Bosco, Salesian missionaries work with the concept that the only way to truly battle poverty is with reason, religion and kindness. Programs strive to instill good moral values that lay a foundation for a better life.



LEBANON

ONGOING PROGRAMS

INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT

In addition to building hospitals, schools and youth centers, Salesian Missions funds infrastructure projects that support both Salesian programs and local communities. This includes bringing clean water, electricity, and internet services to schools and communities.

CAPACITY BUILDING

Salesian Missions engages in projects that increase the capacity of organizations within the worldwide Don Bosco Network, as well as local partner NGOs (nongovernmental organizations). Capacity building helps develop and strengthen the skills, instincts, abilities, processes and resources that communities need to survive and thrive.

FORMATION & SEMINARIAN SUPPORT

As the Salesian presence and work around the world increase, so grows the need for Salesian priests, brothers and educators. The Seminarian and Formation Program ensures that young men called to the Salesian life can train to serve the needs of the young and needy so that St. John Bosco's work will live on for future generations.



DONOR-FUNDED PROJECTS

Memorial Chapel Program

In 2024, the **MEMORIAL CHAPEL PROGRAM** brought faith and community to life by building **32 chapels across five countries** — Guatemala, India, South Sudan, Ghana and Zambia. Thanks to the generosity of donors, these sacred spaces now serve as places of worship for communities that once had nowhere to gather for Mass. Beyond spiritual connection, each chapel offers a vital hub for community life — a place to come together, celebrate and find support in times of need.

DONOR-FUNDED PROJECTS

In 2024, donor support enabled Salesian Missions to fund projects that helped youth overcome challenges and reach new heights in education, skills development, and personal growth. These initiatives provided scholarships, improved learning environments, delivered essential resources, and offered hope to communities in need. From building schools and training centers to providing emergency relief and clean water, donor contributions made a lasting impact on thousands of young lives. The following section highlights country-specific projects that reflect this shared commitment to helping youth achieve their full potential.

ARGENTINA

The Salesian community in Formosa is strengthening the work for youth through Radio Manantial. The goal of the radio station is to provide support to those living in the city and to promote youth voices.

BETHLEHEM

Youth, families and scouts took part in safe and inspiring Christmas events in Bethlehem thanks in part to donor support.

BRAZIL

Salesian missionaries in the Amazon are better able to travel to remote villages to provide people pastoral support thanks to new outboard boat motors. This benefitted more than 1,000 youth and their families living in the Alto Rio Negro region.

ECUADOR

- Youth attending programs at the Madre del Salvador Center have a new recreation and sports area thanks to donor funding. The donation impacted the lives of nearly 150 youth.
- The Salesian Center for Ongoing Formation America has a new generator. One of the challenges the center faced was a lack of electricity due to storms and other issues. Before, power was sometimes out for up to six hours.

DONOR-FUNDED PROJECTS



EGYPT

Salesians in Alexandria were able to provide safe and enriching summer activities for more than 300 vulnerable children from the city's poorest neighborhoods.

GHANA

- The St. Joseph Province in Ashaiman received funding to purchase a car so that missionaries can travel to the Salesian centers in Ghana, Togo, Liberia, Sierra Leone and the Ivory Coast – places where they conduct pastoral work and essential social programs.
- Don Bosco Technical Institute has new laptops and software in its computer lab that supports education and career development.

GUINEA

Job training in Kankan and Siguiri improved the socio-economic living conditions of youth and young adults.

WEST AFRICA

Salesian missionaries in the Our Lady of Peace provincial community were able to provide more than 200 scholarships to youth who are disadvantaged. The Antonio César scholarship program took place in Benin, Burkina Faso, Gambia, Guinea, Mali and Senegal.

INDIA

- Don Bosco Higher Secondary School purchased 15 sets of smart interactive whiteboards to facilitate a more dynamic and engaging learning environment for students.
- Comprehensive care was provided to more than 100 vulnerable boys and girls who reside at Don Bosco Anbu Illam Homes.
- Don Bosco Matriculation Higher Secondary School built a multipurpose open hall that enhances the learning environment for more than 600 students and staff.
- Don Bosco Mission Ponnur has a new vehicle for mission work, ensuring that Salesians have the reliable transportation they need for promoting spiritual growth, community engagement and education through various programs and initiatives.
- Nearly 300 women in the Gadag district took part in skills training to become financially self-sufficient through Bosco Education and Skill Training Center for Women.

ISRAEL

Salesians in Nazareth were able to provide scholarships and psychosocial support for youth.

KENYA

The Don Bosco Technical and Vocational Training Center in Makuyu has undergone much-needed renovations to improve the learning environment for students.

LEBANON

In response to the war in Lebanon, emergency assistance was provided to more than 100 internally displaced people who escaped villages at the border with Israel and south Beirut. Housing and other forms of aid was provided. Additional funding helped ensure that families living in these communities had basic essentials and psychological support.

MYANMAR

MYANMAR

Housing and nutritional meals were provided for 350 boys who now have safe shelter and education.

NAMIBIA

In Rundu, a new parish church was built thanks in part to donor funding. It will benefit more than 13,000 in the local community.

NIGER

Salesian missionaries in Niamey have supported 250 families displaced from the communities of Makalondi and Torodi. Food aid was provided to more than 350 children who were at risk of dying from starvation. In addition, an emergency fund for the immediate needs of displaced persons was created.

PAPUA NEW GUINEA

The Don Bosco Araimiri community in Kerema provided nutritious meals to students and people in the local community.

RWANDA

Youth are being empowered through sports, activities and skills training at the newly renovated Don Bosco Muhazi Recreation Center in Rwanda.

SIERRA LEONE

- Youth at Don Bosco Fambul have a new chapel thanks to donor funding. Programs support street children, girls who have faced sexual abuse, young women who have been forced into prostitution, and youth in trouble with the law.
- Victims of a devastating fire in Bo City received support and resources that helped ensure their safety. Many of the people affected were extremely vulnerable due to a disability, such as blindness or other physical limitations.



SRI LANKA

SRI LANKA

The Don Bosco Institute of Higher Vocational Education, located in the village of Metiyagane, was provided funding. This resulted in new laptops and other necessities to expand a computer lab that provides job skills training to students.



PAPUA NEW GUINEA

DONOR-FUNDED PROJECTS

TANZANIA

Don Bosco Kilimanjaro International Institute for Telecommunications, Electronics and Computers was provided funding to finish the construction of a new hostel for around 300 students.

TOGO

Salesian missionaries in Cinkassé now have a new vehicle to help them travel beyond the main parish, to provide outreach services to youth in 10 locations.

UGANDA

Land was purchased for a new agriculture school that will provide a source of education for poor youth. Food grown at the school will address food security issues in the local community.

UKRAINE

- Funds were provided to ensure heating and electricity was not disrupted over the cold winter. Those in need included children, people with disabilities and chronic illness, the elderly and pregnant women in Zhytomyr, Peremyshlyany, Korostyshev, Bibrka and Odesa.
- A new soccer field was built for more than 400 students at Blessed Klymenty and Andrey Sheptytskyi in Lviv.

VENEZUELA

At the Maria Auxiliadora Popular Technical School, students are gaining important job skills with new equipment and expanded internship opportunities.

ZAMBIA

- Salesian Sisters in Thorn Park, Lusaka, were provided with funding to begin construction on a desperately needed new school for orphans and vulnerable boys and girls. The Garden Open Community School will educate students ages 6–18.
- In Kazembe, a new house was built that can accommodate volunteers working in the Salesian community.
- The Makeni Post Novitiate House has a new security and solar lighting system. The project helps Salesian students and lay collaborators.
- The St. John Bosco Community opened the new Don Bosco Farm which works to enhance learning experiences for students. The farm will also provide a reliable local food source for students and missionaries.

Clean Water Initiative

Salesian Missions is committed to ensuring access to clean water and hygiene in the communities it serves—because water is life. Thanks to your support, families now have safe water for drinking, cooking, and washing, along with improved bathroom facilities that promote health and dignity. These changes mean fewer risks from waterborne illnesses, less time spent on long and difficult journeys to collect water, and cleaner, safer environments for children to learn and grow. In many places, children—especially girls—miss school because they must spend hours each day finding and carrying water for their families. Your generosity helps break this cycle, giving them the chance to focus on education and build a brighter future.

BURUNDI

More than 1,200 students at Don Bosco Ngozi High School will have modern bathroom facilities.

KENYA

Don Bosco Utume Salesian Theological College, a learning center for those who are becoming priests in Nairobi, has new bathrooms in its multi-use field for the community.

MALAWI

Desperately needed clean water access was provided to the Salesian St. Philip Rinaldi Community and the Don Bosco Technical Institute in Lilongwe, benefitting staff and students of the Salesian pre-novitiate.

UGANDA

The Don Bosco Children and Life Mission (Don Bosco CALM) in Namugongo were provided funding for a new rain harvest water system.

GIFTS IN KIND PARTNERSHIPS: MAXIMIZING IMPACT

Gifts in kind are non-monetary donations such as goods or commodities provided by generous partners. These contributions often include essential items like food, medical supplies, educational materials, and other resources that directly support Salesian Missions programs. While these items are donated at no cost, financial contributions make it possible to ship, handle, and deliver them to mission sites around the world.

WHY THESE PARTNERSHIPS MATTER:

Salesian Missions is a trusted partner because organizations know it can ensure donated meals and supplies reach those who need them most—especially children pursuing an education and a path out of poverty. This trust enables Salesian Missions to secure critical resources without purchasing costs, allowing donor dollars to focus on transportation and program delivery—stretching resources further and increasing impact.



Our Partnership with Rise Against Hunger

In 2024, Salesian Missions partnered with **Rise Against Hunger** to deliver nutritious meals to vulnerable populations across multiple countries. This collaboration supported school feeding programs, refugee assistance, vocational training and care for displaced individuals.

Rise Against Hunger is an international humanitarian organization focused on ending hunger worldwide by providing food and life-changing aid to the most vulnerable. Its meals are specially formulated to meet nutritional needs, containing enriched rice, soy protein, dehydrated vegetables, and essential vitamins and minerals. These balanced meals help combat malnutrition, improve health, and give children the energy and focus they need to learn and thrive.

WHY SCHOOL FEEDING MATTERS

Hunger is one of the leading barriers to education. When children lack proper nutrition, they struggle to concentrate, learn, and even attend school. In many communities, a guaranteed meal at school is often the deciding factor for parents to send their children to class rather than keep them home to work or search for food. By providing daily meals, these programs not only fight malnutrition but also improve attendance, reduce dropout rates, and give youth the energy and focus they need to succeed academically and build a brighter future.

BURUNDI

More than **1,600 students** at Don Bosco high schools in Ngozi and Buterere received nutritious meals.

DR CONGO

600 people benefited from meals distributed to five programs, including a prison, hospital, orphanages, a hospice for the elderly, and training centers.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

- **9,700 Haitian refugees and their families** received meals to support nutritional needs.
- **550 people** from families of students at the Institute of the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians also benefited.

HAITI

5,300 youth received meals distributed to Salesian centers and schools throughout the year, supporting education, vocational training, and social programs.

SOUTH SUDAN

1,800 internally displaced people in a Salesian camp in Gumbo, near Juba, had access to better nutrition.

TIMOR-LESTE

Approximately **2,000 youth** benefited from a year-long nutrition project called “Rewrite the Future.”

UGANDA

3,780 youth and students across Don Bosco CALM, Don Bosco School Bombo, vocational schools in Bombo and Kamuli, and three additional Salesian schools received meals.

PRIVATE SUPPORT

Generous donations from individual Americans account for most of the aid dispensed by Salesian Missions. These funds are received primarily through direct mail solicitations and online donations. Groups and organizations (both secular and religious) such as schools, community groups, foundations, private agencies and companies (through donation-matching programs) account for the remaining portion of private funding.

SUPPORT FROM HOST COUNTRIES

In line with the Salesian policy of fostering independence from outside help, Salesian Missions has nurtured an attitude of “helping people help themselves.” Therefore, support is provided for capacity building and technical assistance efforts that empower local Salesian NGOs (implementing partners) to seek and obtain local funds from individuals, businesses and governments in host countries to support programs within those countries. These funds are not reflected in the distribution chart provided in this Annual Report.
